- images and short text from local history about Saxon Hall and the local area especially if it relates to Peace, local people and the community.
- short text like sayings, stories, memories that can be carved onto the sculpture's surface.
- Images of drawings, quick sketches, diagrams, photos, your clay models, notes or any other artwork that can be used to inspire and inform the design of the Sculpture. Many of these will also be carved into the surface of the sculpture to inspire the hope and feeling of belonging that we know matters so much.








- Think of the things that bring you comfort through The Corvid 19 Lock-down or other experiences where friends, safety, security and companionship helped.
